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ALLIED LOSSES LIGHT IN GREAT BATTLE OF CORAL SEA

Jap fleet repulsed with 11 ships sunk, 6 damaged; "our attacks to continue"

Allied losses in the naval battle off north-eastern Australia are "relatively light," compared with those of the Japanese.

Last night's communique from Allied Headquarters, South-west Pacific, announces this.

Latest official tally of enemy losses is 11 ships sunk and six damaged. Nine of the vessels sunk and four of those damaged are warships.

The communique says the only reason Allied losses are not revealed now is because disclosure would give Japan valuable information.

Details of Japanese losses, in a communique yesterday from the U.S. Navy Department at Washington, were:
