Veterans Day & Remembrance Day – TH01 Makes History


Post TH01 reached a historic milestone this month by participating in Remembrance Day ceremonies in two locations at the same time—a first for our Post.

Dear Members,


After nearly a decade of serving as your Post Adjutant and Finance Officer, I've come to a significant realization. While my tenure has been incredibly rewarding, I believe that my long-standing presence in these roles is no longer beneficial but rather detrimental to our Post's growth and vitality.

My reflection has brought to light disadvantages of long tenure in Post positions:

- **Creates "tunnel vision":** When the same members hold key positions for many years, they may struggle to see new possibilities or adapt to changing circumstances. This can cause the Post to continue with the same routines even when internal or external pressures, such as declining membership or new generations of veterans, require fresh approaches.
- **Discourages new members and volunteers:** A small group of long-serving officers can make a Post appear cliquey and unwelcoming to new members, who may feel their opinions and suggestions are not valued. New members may feel that there is no room for them to rise in leadership, decreasing their motivation to join. This can stifle enthusiasm among newer, potentially active members, leading them to disengage or leave.
- **Stifles fresh ideas and innovation:** A change in leadership brings new perspectives on how to attract and engage members, operate programs, and serve the community. Post leaders with excessively long tenure may resist new ideas, making it difficult for the Post to adapt to the needs of modern veterans. Older members may not be interested in or comfortable with modernizing the post, which can hinder its ability to use technology or adapt its programs to a younger demographic.
- **Lack of relevant programming:** Posts may become stuck on programs and events that primarily appeal to their older, long-term members, failing to create activities that attract a younger, more diverse membership.
- Long-term incumbents may be unwilling to train or mentor younger members, leading to a leadership vacuum when older members eventually leave or step down.
- It can cause stagnation of post activities and community involvement
- **Missed opportunities:** Stagnant leadership might miss opportunities to partner with new organizations or take advantage of new funding or program opportunities that could benefit the post and its members.
- **Erosion of purpose:** Over time, the post's programs and activities may lose their connection to the current needs of veterans and the community, weakening the post's overall purpose and impact.
- American Legion Posts face decline as younger veterans opt out
- **Concentrates power and causes division:** Without regular rotation, power can become concentrated in a few individuals or a small clique, leading to poor communication and resentment. This can result in members feeling ignored, creating division and negativity that detracts from the organization's mission.

To address these issues and foster a more dynamic and welcoming Post environment for both new and existing members, I have decided to step down from my position and take a step back for a while. This will create opportunities for others to contribute their unique perspectives and ideas, which I believe will ultimately strengthen our Post.

The United States Marine Corps was founded on November 10, 1775, when the Second Continental Congress passed a resolution establishing two battalions of Marines. These Marines were created to serve as naval infantry, capable of fighting both at sea and on land. This date is now celebrated every year as the Marine Corps Birthday.

Although Marine recruiting happened in several locations in Philadelphia, tradition holds that the first enlistments occurred at Tun Tavern, making it the symbolic birthplace of the Corps.

The first commissioned officer and "first Commandant" was Captain Samuel Nicholas: appointed by Congress to lead the first Marines, tasked with recruiting and organizing the new battalions and led early Marine operations during the American Revolution.

The original mission of the Marines included shipboard security and combat, amphibious raids, supporting naval operations, and landing parties and boarding actions.

One of the first significant operations was the Raid on New Providence (Bahamas) in 1776, led by Marines to capture military supplies from the British.

After the Revolutionary War, the Continental Marines were disbanded in 1783. The Marine Corps was reestablished on July 11, 1798 by an act of Congress. This permanent establishment placed the Corps under the Department of the Navy, where it remains today.

Over the 19th and 20th centuries, the Marine Corps evolved into a rapid-response expeditionary force, an expert in amphibious warfare and a key component of America's national security strategy.

Some of the major developments included the "Small Wars" era (Caribbean and Central America), World War I heroics at Belleau Wood, World War II amphibious mastery in the Pacific campaign, and the integration of aviation, armor, and specialized units in modern warfare.

1ST TO FIGHT

The mission of the United States Marine Corps (USMC) is formally defined in Title 10 of the U.S. Code, Section 5063. In summary, the Marine Corps' mission is to be an expeditionary force in readiness — capable of responding rapidly to crises and conducting operations on land, at sea, and in the air.

Core Mission

"To be the nation's force in readiness, prepared to fight and win battles in any environment."

Specific Responsibilities

Under U.S. law and Marine Corps doctrine, the mission includes:

- Seizing and defending advanced naval bases and other land operations essential to naval campaigns.
- Providing forces for service with the Navy in the seizure or defense of bases, and for land operations essential to a naval campaign.
- Developing tactics, techniques, and equipment for amphibious warfare.
- Providing detachments and organizations for service on naval ships and security at naval stations and bases.
- Performing other duties as directed by the President or the Secretary of Defense, such as humanitarian missions, embassy security, and counterterrorism operations.



Motto

"Semper Fidelis" — Always Faithful.

This motto reflects the Corps' commitment to loyalty, duty, and readiness to defend the United States at a moment's notice.

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Home

Fire Safety - Quick Check List

- Smoke alarms: Install on every floor, inside sleeping areas and outside them; test monthly and replace batteries annually or when chirping.
- Escape plan: Two exits from each room, a designated meeting point outside, practice twice a year.
- Fire extinguisher: Have a multipurpose (ABC) extinguisher accessible in the kitchen and near high-risk areas; know the PASS method (Pull, Aim, Squeeze, Sweep).
- Electrical safety: Replace frayed cords, avoid overloading sockets or long daisy-chains, unplug unused appliances.
- Cooking safety: Never leave cooking unattended; keep flammable items away from the stove.

SAFETY AWARENESS

Kitchen safety (highest risk area)

- Stay with cooking: If frying or grilling, stay nearby; if you must leave, turn off the heat.
- Grease fires: Never use water; cover pan with a lid and turn off heat, or use a dry powder/ABC extinguisher if safe.
- Appliance maintenance: Clean range hoods and ovens regularly to remove grease buildup.
- Safe storage: Store flammable liquids (kerosene, petrol) outside the house in approved containers.

Electrical and heating safety

- Certified installation: Use licensed electricians for wiring, new outlets, and major appliances.
- Appliance tips: Turn off fans, heaters, and air conditioners when unattended overnight; keep portable heaters at least 1 metre from combustibles.
- Circuit protection: Fit fuses or breakers sized correctly for each circuit; consider residual-current devices (RCDs) for outlets near water.
- Power strips: Use only surge-protected strips with a single high-current appliance per wall outlet.

Alarms, detection, and night-time habits

- Smoke alarms placement: Ceiling-mounted is best; avoid installing too close to kitchens or bathrooms where false alarms are likely.
- Interlinked alarms: If possible, use interlinked alarms so all sound if one detects smoke.

- Night routines: Keep bedroom doors closed at night to slow fire spread; keep a torch and keys near the bed.

Escape planning and practice

- Family plan: Draw a simple floor map showing two escape routes from each room and the outdoor meeting point.
- Practice drills: Time your drills, practise low crawling under smoke, and rehearse helping children, elderly, or pets.
- Locked doors/windows: Keep keys easily reachable; ensure window bars have quick-release mechanisms.
- If trapped: Seal gaps with wet towels, signal from a window, and shout to attract attention rather than opening doors to smoke.

Special situations and recovery

- Children and smoking: Never leave lighters or matches where children can reach; discourage indoor smoking.
- Gas and fuel safety: Store and handle LPG cylinders per vendor guidance; install and maintain gas leak detectors where appropriate.
- After a fire: Do not re-enter until authorities declare it safe; photograph damage for insurance and contact your insurer promptly.
- Local help: Know the local emergency number and nearest fire station; keep contacts written and saved on every phone.

LOOKING BACK

Courage Under Fire


On a high-risk raid in Herat Province, Afghanistan, on October 5, 2009, Combat Controller SSgt Robert Gutierrez Jr. faced an impossible situation. His team was pinned down by a superior enemy force, and SSgt Gutierrez was shot in the chest by an armor-piercing round, resulting in a collapsed lung and severe injuries.

Despite believing he had only minutes to live, the severely wounded Gutierrez refused medical evacuation. As the sole Joint Terminal Attack Controller (JTAC), he knew his role coordinating air support was the only way to save his team.

In an incredible display of heroism, he ignored his catastrophic wounds and directed three "danger close" A-10 strafing runs, with rounds impacting just 30 feet from his position. After a medic performed an emergency procedure to re-inflate his lung, he continued to control airpower.

SSgt Gutierrez's unwavering focus and precise control of firepower saved the lives of his teammates and allowed them to successfully escape the kill zone. His actions earned him the Air Force Cross, the service's second-highest award for valor. His story remains a powerful testament to the extreme courage and selfless dedication of our Combat Controllers.

THAI DRIVER'S LICENSE RENEWAL

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I recently had to renew my Thai driver's license which expired while I was in the US. I was concerned that because it expired, I would have to be required to sit through a movie or take a driving test. I went to the website and looked up the requirements for renewing the license. I found out that you have one year to get it renewed before any penalty. All I needed was my passport, medical certificate, proof of residency, expired license and a short test that can be taken online.

I looked up the test, took it and at the end they gave a QR Code which you need to show when applying for your renewal. Five years ago, to get my residency letter, I had to go to the tourist police but this time it was immigration. My next step was to make an appointment online. Could not do. So, I did a walk in at the Transportation office in Ubon. They said December 19 was the earliest date that was available. They also said that I can get this done anywhere, even outside of Ubon province. I was going to Mukdahan anyway, so today I went to the office. I walked right in. No lines. Great! When they asked for the QR Code I proudly showed it to them.

Unfortunately, when I took a photo of it, I didn't notice the date was at



the bottom and missed it when I took the photo. She asked me what my password was when I took the test and of course since I took the test five days ago, I couldn't remember. She was able to find the date so we pressed on. Next, I took the color test and brake test and passed with no problem. Then a big problem. When I got my current license, I used a passport that has since expired. The number on the license was from my old passport. My new passport has a different number so when she noticed that she asked me for the old passport. That passport expired 4 years ago. I was going to destroy it but for some reason, I kept it. The problem was it was at my home which is a 2 1/2 hour drive from Mukdahan. So, I drove home to get it and drove back to Mukdahan. Tomorrow morning, I should get my license. I was told that driving on an expired license could get me in trouble with the police even though I couldn't get an appointment until Dec 19. The penalty is a 2,000 baht fine.

So, if any of you will be renewing your license, be sure that the number on the new license will match the number on the expired license. Otherwise, you will need your old passport or a photo of your old passport. I believe you can renew a license 6 months before it expires.



As your Post Service Officer, I also serve in the capacity as an "Advocate". This means I will assist all veterans and their family members as an advisor on all matters pertaining to VA Claims for service connected medical issues and veterans benefits, and for VA spousal benefits and compensation after a veteran has passed away.


Many retired veterans are either hesitant or even reluctant to file VA Disability Claims. This is mainly due to a veteran believing that medical issues that develop years after retirement, are not related to their military service, but to advanced aging.

Vietnam War Era veterans who served in Vietnam or Thailand, may have been exposed to Agent Orange in those countries. Gulf War veterans who served in Middle Eastern countries or Afghanistan, may have also been exposed to Burn Pits or other hazardous chemicals in those regions as well. Agent Orange was also used in South Korea and was also stored on other Pacific Islands, where US military personnel were stationed.

As the Service Officer I do not have all the answers to all your questions about the VA and other matters. However, I will work tirelessly to find the information you seek, in order for you and your spouses to make correct choices and informed decisions.
