

- Maintain a balanced program that provides for their physical, emotional, intellectual and spiritual needs.

#### Children and Youth Programs Con't from pg 3

In the years after the American Legion's founding, members realized that neglect of family and child welfare problems affected disabled veterans' rehabilitation. Following a year of careful study, the organization adopted the American Legion Child Welfare program in 1924.

Established a year later, in 1925, the American Legion National Child Welfare Division put forward the "Whole Child" Plan, stating that the child of every veteran "should have a home ... health, education, character, and opportunity." The three principles found in Resolution No. 199 (Fall 1951) titled, "Re-Emphasize Three Major Principles of Child Welfare Programs of The American Legion," are:

- Strengthen the family unit against the forces of a more complex society. The American Legion recognizes that the optimal environment for children is at home with his or her own parents. Our efforts have always been directed toward keeping the family together.
- Extend support to sound organizations and facilities that provide services for children and youth. The American Legion always acts in a supplementary capacity rather than duplicating the efforts of existing agencies.
- Maintain a well-rounded program that meets the needs of today's young people. This third principle provides elasticity to address all matters of child health and child welfare; and affirms The American Legion's commitment to all children.

While these principles are the heart of the "Whole Child" Plan, four methods are the muscle: Education, Legislation, Material Aid and Prevention. Further information can be found in the Children and Youth Department Program Guide.

In 1938, April was formally designated as Child Welfare Month (now called Children & Youth Month) and has continued on an annual basis.

Over the decades, the development of new and improved public programs to provide economic security for children has made it possible for the Legion to focus on other problem areas. To date, no area of child welfare has gone untouched by the collective hand of The American Legion. The very program of Children & Youth itself is unique from any agency, governmental or private, in its ability to expand from every area of concern for child welfare and health.

Temporary Financial Assistance - Through TFA, an American Legion post can call upon the national organization for cash assistance to help maintain the basic needs of children of active-duty servicemembers or American Legion members. Non-

repayable grants are awarded to eligible families with a child in need when all other resources have been exhausted.

Child Safety - The American Legion's Committee on Children & Youth believes that child safety is everyone's concern. Prevention through education remains the best way to keep children safe. To promote child safety, The American Legion publishes several useful brochures to educate children and parents and supports numerous national initiatives to keep children safe. Areas covered include: Child pornography • Drug abuse prevention • Drug trafficking • Alcohol abuse prevention • Child/sexual abuse and neglect • Teen suicide prevention

<u>Child Health</u> – the American Legion Child Health efforts on encouraging families to ensure children and youth are current with necessary vaccines and health concerns including: • Immunization programs • School nutrition programs • Teen pregnancy prevention programs

Family Support - The American Legion recognizes that families of active-duty and deployed military personnel face unique difficulties and hardships. With the help of the Family Support Network, these families do not have to shoulder this burden alone. They can connect with American Legion Family members by requesting assistance through the nationwide toll-free number or electronic application. Legionnaires at the post level then provide assistance such as performing minor household chores and repairs, completing a Temporary Financial Assistance application and connecting the family with local programs, this program which includes TFA focuses on the total family of active-duty military member and includes: National Family Week activities • Day care safety • Foster care • Missing and Exploited Children Awareness

<u>Child Well-Being Foundation</u> - The American Legion Child Well-Being Foundation (formerly called the Child Welfare Foundation) accomplishes their goals each year by awarding grants to nonprofit youth-serving organizations for disseminating information that conforms to the foundation's purpose. Since 1954, more than \$17 million has been granted to help deserving organizations produce and distribute current and valuable information.

<u>Veterans and Children Foundation</u> - The purpose is twofold: to fund service officer training and provide free assistance for disabled veterans and to extend a financial safety net for needy military and veteran families with children.


that all branches of the military are supported. Air

- According to a report by the Department of Defense there are 700 military child development program facilities around the world, running approximately 155,000 child-care spaces, with another 3,000 Family Child Care homes.
- ↓ It's estimated that military child development centers welcome around 200,000 children daily. There are 300 youth and teen centers worldwide serving more than 645,000 youth through a variety of educational and recreational programs.
- Approximately 2 million military children have experienced a parental deployment since 9/11.
- There are currently 1.2 million military children of active duty members worldwide.
- Nearly 80% of military children attend public schools throughout the United States.
- The average military family moves three times more often than their civilian counterpart.
- There are nearly two million "total-force dependent children" including more than 900,000 Army dependents, 400,000 Air Force dependents, nearly 300,000 Navy and approximately 118,000 Marine dependents.









