VOICES

"The American Legion was founded after World War I ravaged Europe. We are extremely concerned about the horrific consequences that occur during war. There is absolutely no justification for Russia's aggression. Our resolution calls for peace in Ukraine and, in conjunction with NATO and the Russian Federation, supports a European security architecture which considers the national security interests of all parties ... We agree with the White House's decision to not send troops to Ukraine, as we continue to support a strong national defense and a strategy of vigilance."

Amount in emergency aid provided directly to veterans in need from local American Legion post funds in the last membership year, according to the 2020-21 Consolidated Post Report, with just 62% reporting.

\$59,000+

Average annual starting salary of an employee trained through the Veteran Employment Through Technology Education Courses (VET TEC) pilot program, initially authorized in the American Legion-supported Harry W. Colmery Veterans Educational Assistance Act of 2017. VET TEC connects student veterans with VA-approved training providers to acquire high-demand skills and certifications in technical areas such as information science, computer programming and data processing. According to Feb. 2 American Legion testimony before Congress, 4,700 veterans have participated in the program, with an 88% graduation rate and a 72% employment rate.

Amount raised for homeless-veteran support programs in Wisconsin after a third "Sleepout for Veterans" overnighter, led by Sons of The American Legion Squadron 294 in Hartland, raised awareness. More than 30 American Legion Family members slept in tents and cardboard boxes Feb. 11-13 in bitterly cold weather to clearly understand what homeless veterans deal with every day, especially during winter.
