"I struggle to think of a single person that I deployed with who may not have been exposed, at some point, to toxins ... While it was our decision to raise our hands and fight our nation's wars for those who cannot or will not, what we didn't know was that our long-lasting health issues might not even begin to show during our time in service."

-American Legion Veterans Affairs & Rehabilitation Division Director Katie Purswell in a March 2 press conference at the U.S. Capitol urging Congress to advance the Honoring Our PACT Act that would streamline access to health care and increase government accountability to veterans exposed to toxins caused by burn pits and other airborne exposures.


