


APRIL 2022 MEMBERSHIP IMPACT REPORT

VOICES

"For veterans of the post-9/11 era, it recognizes illnesses caused by airborne toxins from burn pits. It also provides long-awaited relief for those who passed through the contaminated air base known as K2 early in the war. It expands care and disability benefits to veterans suffering with Gulf War Illness and accepts the scientific reality that previously ignored conditions are connected to Agent Orange exposure. To sick veterans exposed to radiation from atomic testing, time is of the essences for the PACT Act. The House has done its part. Now, it's up to the Senate."
