Dillard, following the Aug. 10 signing into law of the Sergeant First Class Heath Robinson Honoring Our Promise to Address Comprehensive Toxics (PACT) Act that will provide health care and benefits for millions of veterans exposed to toxic contamination in military service, including some 3.5 million post-9/11 veterans who were exposed to burn pits in Iraq and Afghanistan



Number of emails sent to U.S. senators in the days after the Senate delayed passage of the PACT Act on a technicality at the end of July; the grassroots outreach effort led to Senate passage of the bill, by an 86-11 tally, on Aug. 2 that will help millions of veterans exposed to toxic contaminants in the service.



Health-care conditions, including a dozen cancers, that are now presumed to have been serviceconnected for veterans of the Gulf War and the Global War on Terrorism, under the PACT Act.


## \$2.5 million
