HERE ARE THE RULES ABOUT VAPING IN THAILAND

"The Thai Government introduced a ban on electronic cigarettes (e-cigarettes or 'vaping'), shisha smoking, and electronic shishas in 2014, for "health reasons and to discourage young people from starting to smoke". The Tourism Authority of Thailand (TAT) is reminding visitors to the country about this ban, which is part of the Tobacco Control Law, and the law prohibiting smoking in public areas."

MESSAGE FOR U.S. CITIZENS IN THAILAND (22 JUNE 2022) RECREATIONAL USE OF MARIJUANA IN PUBLIC IS ILLEGAL IN THAILAND

"Thailand made marijuana legal for medical purposes on June 9, 2022. However, according to a health directive announced in the Royal Gazette on June 14, anyone smoking cannabis and hemp in public for recreational purposes shall face imprisonment of up to three months or a fine of up to 25,000 baht if they cause a public nuisance or pose health hazards to others."

Greetings Comrades,

I would like to welcome all our new and returning members who join our Post this Past year. You are encouraged to bring your talents and help elevate your Post to the next level. Your fresh perspectives and new ideas are needed. If you are hesitant to step up to an officer position or feel you don't have the knowledge level to take on the role, we can help. First step is to take the American Legion Basic Training. It's a non-pressure course that will provide you wealth of knowledge on the American Legion. The course covers five topics: history and organization; Veterans Affairs & Rehabilitation; National Security; Americanism; and Children & Youth. Each topic offers ways in which you can help advance the Post's values and services in our local communities. Just click on this link <u>= American Legion Basic Training Course</u>.

In addition to the basic training course, we have asked the incumbent officers to create Continuity /Transition guides for their successors. This will help ensure a smooth transition and have a document that highlights the lessons learned and best practices. The Post elections are just around the corner in April. To the current officers if you haven't completed your continuity guide, we urge you to do so as soon as possible. Do not worry about format, we can take care of that later. Just get it down on paper. If you need help contact me, we can work together. We owe it to your successor.

To make it easier and less stressful to the new officers The Executive Committee decided to change our business year from the calendar year to (July – June). This will agree with both the Department and National reporting periods. Most of our reports such as the Annual Consolidated Post Report (CPR) due dates are in June of each year. Also, our next year's membership drive starts in July 1st and ends in May. (*Note: Not to be confused, the membership is a calendar year, i.e. 2024 membership starts January 1st and <i>expires on December 31, 2024.)* Most importantly this allows the new incoming officers over two months to transition with the outgoing officers. It also allows the new officers a chance to develop their program, form their committee, and formulate their budget before the start of the business year. It is a win for the new officers and a win for the Post.

Nominations for the elected officer positions start in March. We highly encourage self-nominating for the position you are interested in. We urge all of you to look at not only the elected positions but also the appointed positions. If you are not comfortable at taking over any of the positions, consider being an assistant where you can learn the position first hand. A post cannot survive on its own, it must have members willing to do their part. We need YOU!

SAFETY MESSAGE

FEBRUARY IS HEART HEALTH AWARENESS MONTH

The best way to survive a heart attack is to never have one. How can you prevent becoming one of the millions of Americans who suffer a heart attack? There is actually a lot you can do to protect your heart. Knowing the risks and symptoms of heart disease is a good start.

Key risk factors for heart disease are:

- High Cholesterol;
- Hypertension;
- Smoking;
- Diabetes;
- Unhealthy body weight;
- Too much alcohol; and
- Lack of physical activity.

An important risk factor that none of us has control of is our age. The medium age of our Post members is 69. Your risk for heart disease goes up as you age. In fact, heart disease is the leading cause of death in people 65 and older. The good news is there are lifestyle choices and changes you can make to lower your risk. When you control your risk factors, you help protect your heart. It's easy to get started.

Here are a few ideas:

Eat healthy meals.

- Add exercise to your life.
- If you smoke, quit.
- Drink alcohol moderately

Heart disease is the leading cause of death for men and women. The most common type of heart disease is coronary artery disease, which can lead to a heart attack. While some heart attacks are sudden and intense, others can start slowly with mild pain or discomfort. Often people aren't sure what's wrong and wait too long before getting help.

Pay attention to any of the following warnings of a possible heart attack:

- Chest pain or discomfort;
- Pain or discomfort in the jaw, neck or back;
- Feeling weak, light-headed or faint;
- Pain in arms or shoulder;
- Shortness of breath; and
- Nausea (an extra symptom in women).



HISTORY ARTICLE

HERE ARE SOME HISTORIC HAPPENINGS IN THE MONTH OF FEBRUARY

Feb 1,2003: The space shuttle Columbia broke apart in flight.

Feb 2,1848: The treaty of Guadulupe Hidalgo was signed ending the Mexican-American war.

Feb 3,1943: Four US Army Chaplains gave their life jackets to frightened soldiers as their ship sank. The Chaplains went down with the ship.

Feb 4,1861: Apache Chief Cochise was arrested and escaped declaring war which lasted for 25 years.

Feb 10,1942: The first Medal of Honor during WWII was awarded to 2nd. Lt Alexander Nininger for heroism during the battle of Bataan.

Feb 9,1943: The battle of Guadacanel ended after six months at a cost of 6,000 Japanese and 2,000 Americans.

Feb 13,1945: British and American planes bombed Dresden, Germany causing a firestorm that lasted for four days and killed an estimated 135,000 German civilians.

Feb 15,1898: The USS Maine with 260 crew members was blown up while in Cuba. War was declared in Spain on April 25th.

Feb 19,1942: 110,000 Japanese American citizens were sent to internment camps.

Feb 23,1942: The first attack on the US mainland occurred when a Japanese sub shelled an oil refinery near Santa Barbara, California resulting in minor damage.

Feb 27,1991: Desert Storm ended when allied troops entered Kuwait after launching the offensive four days earlier.

SERVICE OFFICER ... LARRY HAYNIE

I would like to touch on a subject that is very important to me, as well as it should be to all American military veterans who are married to a Thai spouse. I believe we all deeply care for the welfare of our loved ones, The best way we can do this, especially living in Thailand, is for us to make a "Last Will and Testament".

A Will helps to provide provisions for your family's financial well-being, should a veteran unexpectedly pass away. A Will can name an Executor, who will be responsible for the disposition of your financial assets and personal property, in a manner you deem fit. Thai spouses must go through the Thai Probate Court system to obtain access to your assets, but this can be very time consuming and stressful. This may put a hardship on your spouse and family, especially if they need financial assistance to help sustain their health and safety. I have personally used a legal advisory service called "ThaiLawOnline". They offer services such as Wills, legal consultations, Notary services, dealing with the Thai Legal system. I highly recommend ThaiLawOnline for all your legal issues.
