We don't often get to hear reports about positive events in the news lately. The global pandemic has impacted each of our communities to varying degrees. Ubon Ratchathani had been spared much of the hardship encountered by cities that depended economically on the tourist trade, due in no small part to the fact that we are not usually considered a top-tier tourist location to begin with.

In July, overcrowding in the capital led to the relocation of Covid-19 infected persons back to their home of records. A field hospital was established to receive and house those returning to this city who are infected. Not long after this, our province slipped from orange to a red zone and now to a dark red zone with nighttime curfews in effect. Our Posts' host city is filled with a spirit of self-reliance, perseverance, overwhelming generosity, and humility. It had been by chance that I learned about the suffering just below the surface of those less fortunate in our community.

With great pride, I am pleased to inform you that our Post, TH01, has heard the call for help and has risen to meet the challenge. Effective Monday, 16 August 2021, every item urgently requested by our local field hospital has been purchased and is enroute to those that need it. I will personally ensure the delivery and proper use of said items.

We accomplished this using only a portion of our Posts' disaster relief fund; all other funds were left untouched. Medical supplies are also on their way to Mukdahan as well. If you can identify a specific need in your local area, reach out to one of your post officers and let us know.

#### **1. Donation to Pho Sai Emergency Clinic**

On August 28, the American Legion Post TH01 made a donation to Phosai Community Isolation Center to help with disasters related to the Covid-19 outbreak on small communities.

The donation was made at Phosai Wittaya School to the Phosai Community Isolation Center for 1,500 gloves, 1,000 masks, 5 thermometers, 4 hazmat suits and 20 cases of water. They were received from Post Member-at-Large Kirby Raines with open arms and smiles from the staff working at the center.



#### **2. Donation to Ubon Field Hospital**

Urgently requested supplies were donated on behalf of The American Legion, TH01 members to a local Covid-19 field hospital. The field hospital has been established on the campus of the



Pathumpittayakhom High School in Ubon Ratchathani. The purpose of the field hospital is to manage the quarantine of Covid-19 infected individuals returned to their home province from the capital, Bangkok, due to overcrowding. Commander Bruce Templeman and 1<sup>st</sup> Vice Commander John Skabry presented local dignitaries and community leaders; Pathum District Mayor(Nayok), Mr. Thong Charoen, Pathum Village

Chief (Gamnan), Mr. Songsak Thaloengram, School Assistant Director Nakonchai Wongjan, Director of Health Promotion Mrs. Bantheing Phonsawat, School Finance Chief Mrs. Sukrita Umiang, School Finance Assistant Chief Mrs. Phedcahad Skabry CDCU personnel, were on present and staff expressed deep appreciation for the gifts, which included: five weatherproof beds, 300 soups, two liters of Gel Alcohol, three pulse oximeters, three digital thermometers, twenty Tyvek PPE suits, five boxes of surgical masks, ten privacy curtain tarpaulins and six AAA batteries.

All the items were supplied quickly and cheerfully by the members of The American Legion, Post TH01, located in Ubon Ratchathani, Thailand.

**Our next event will be the Veterans Day Remembrance Ceremony at Thung Si Muang Park (Ubon Ratchathani) on 11 November 2021. We will be discussing our participation in detail at the October meeting.**



**FROM THE DESK OF THE POST SERVICE OFFICER.**

The following benefits are available through VA's [Pension and Fiduciary Service](#) for use in planning and preparing for the future.

- VA [pension](#) is payable to wartime Veterans who are permanently and totally disabled due to non-service-connected disability, or who are age 65 years old or older, and who meet certain income and net worth limits.
- [Special monthly pension](#) is an additional benefit for Veterans in receipt of pension who are housebound, require the aid and attendance of another person to help them with daily activities (such as eating, bathing, and dressing), have very limited eyesight or require nursing home care.
- For surviving spouses, there are two types of benefits P&F Service offers. [Survivors Pension](#) provides monthly payments to qualified surviving spouses and unmarried dependent children of wartime Veterans who meet certain income and net worth limits. Special monthly pension is also available to surviving spouses who are housebound or require the aid and attendance of another person.
- [Dependency and Indemnity Compensation](#) is available to dependents and parents and generally is not based on income and assets (except the income limits apply to parents). DIC is a

monthly monetary benefit paid to a surviving spouse, child or parent of a Veteran who died from a service-related injury or illness, or when an active-duty service member dies in the line of duty. Special monthly DIC is also available to surviving spouses who are housebound or require the aid and attendance of another person.

- A surviving spouse of a Veteran who served on a Blue Water Navy vessel offshore of the Republic of Vietnam, or on another U.S. Navy or Coast Guard ship operating in the coastal waterways of Vietnam between Jan. 9, 1962 and May 7, 1975, may be eligible for DIC benefits — [even if they were previously denied](#).
- VA's [funeral and burial benefits](#) are available for both service-related and non-service-related deaths. New regulations allow a flat-rate burial and plot or interment allowance with decreased paperwork and maximum payment permitted by law.
- For those interested in burial benefits such as a Presidential Memorial Certificate, burial flag, headstone, or marker, the [National Cemetery Administration](#) has information about pre-need eligibility.

## **FROM THE POST HISTORIAN**

### **The 13 Mercury Astronaut Women**

Back in the early 60's, there was a secret program to become America's first female astronauts. They passed all the same physiological screening tests required of the original Mercury Seven astronauts, but NASA shut the program down before any of them could go to space.

When NASA introduced its first astronaut corps in 1959, it was strictly a men's only club. Although women weren't explicitly barred from the "Mercury Seven," NASA's requirement that astronauts be experienced military jet test pilots, a job open only to men, effectively prevented their selection.

There were good reasons for having women astronauts. Medicine experts believed that women, because they were lighter, shorter, ate less food, and consumed less oxygen than men. It was also found that women were more resistant to radiation and less prone to cardiovascular issues.

Air Force Brigadier General Donald Flickinger and Dr. Randy Lovelace was looking for candidates when they found Jerri Cobb, a licensed commercial pilot at the age of 18, Cobb was flying routes

from California to Paraguay. By 1960 she had logged 10,000 hours in the cockpit, twice that of astronaut John Glenn.

Jerri was the first woman selected to participate in the secret program which was not sanctioned by NASA. She did the same tests that were given to the Mercury Seven. Not only did she pass all the tests, but she also surpassed the male astronauts on some tests.

To see if Cobb's results could be replicated, two more female pilots were recruited. Wally Funk, a 21-year-old flight instructor and Janey Hart, 39-year-old mother of eight and wife of Senator Phillip Hart. Jackie Cochran, the first woman to break the sound barrier, used her own money to finance the privately run program. The women outperformed the men on several medical and screening tests.

The Mercury 13 were ready to undergo space flight simulation at a navy facility in Florida. Days before leaving they learned that the program was cancelled once the navy learned the program was not sponsored by NASA. Credit to the History Channel.
